

Sixth Form Transformation

We are delighted to announce that after months of renovation work, our beautiful transformed Sixth Form Centre is now fully open!

As many of our Old Scholars and Sidcotian network know, work has been underway over the past few terms to renovate our Sixth Form Centre, which was initially opened by Chairman of the Development Committee, George W. Ford-Smith in May 1965.

This was a much needed project (despite the affection held for the upper-floor studies!), particularly to allow Lower and Upper Sixth students to work and collaborate together, preparing them for life after School. In line with our Quaker values of sustainability,

improvements were made to the existing building, with an emphasis on environmental considerations, including solar panels to generate all of the Centre's electricity, and clever air handling units that were installed to heat and provide fresh air efficiently.

The result of this project is staggering: students, parents and Sidcotians alike have given fantastic feedback on their first impressions, and we have already seen its impact in terms of retention and recruitment into Lower Sixth. Upper Sixth student Caitlin Taylor comments:

"It has been great to be part of the Sidcot Sixth Form Transformation, from start to finish. Our feedback during the design phase was definitely taken on board and the end result is a working and social space that really supports our learning journey at an important time. It's a really great place to hang out too!"

This project has also been an extraordinary one in terms of the scale of the support that we have so generously been given by our Sidcotian community. We were lucky enough to receive a £600,000 grant from the **Sidcot Building Trust Fund (SBTF)** towards the project, and members of the Trust including Wiz Marks and John Highfield joined President Sarah Fulcher at the Easter Reunion to say a few words and "cut the ribbon" to open the new Centre.



We would also like to give our sincere thanks to the Sidcot Education Trust, the George Cadbury Trust, the Sir James Reckitt Trust, the Quartet Foundation and many more individuals who supported our Sixth Form Campaign and enabled the transformation to happen. We thank parents Emma and Julian Sage and their company Complete CNC Solutions for providing the signage throughout the building, and the daughters of Old Scholar René Isaac for donating two beautiful bespoke oak tables (pictured) to enable the 'Harkness' teaching method to be used in the Centre. This proven pedagogical technique holds equality at its core, in line with our Quaker values, and enables all voices (student and teacher) around the table to be given equal weighting.







We also thank OS Roger Croker for enabling new Sixth Form 'Living Adventurously' Scholarships as part of this campaign project, and the Sidcot School PTA for its support. All donors not wishing to remain anonymous have been listed in a plaque within the new Centre and in the final pages of this Report. Without your support, we could not have completed this project, so thank you.

The SBTF was set up by alumni of the School in January 1959 with the primary purpose to make grants to Sidcot School for purchasing or erecting property for, or improving the property of the School.

IMPACT:

Over the years, the SBTF has had a transformative impact on the Sidcot School site and buildings. Among many others, it has significantly contributed towards the creation of the following:

- the School Swimming Pool
- the beautiful Arts Centre Building (pictured)
- the original Sixth Form buildings in 1967 and the transformation of the Sixth Form Centre in 2022/23

During the Covid-19 pandemic, the SBTF also supported the upkeep of the School premises with significant emergency funds.

The Experience of a Bursary

Our bursary programme ensures that young people who would flourish at Sidcot are given that opportunity, regardless of their family's financial circumstances. Nearly a fifth of donations made in 2022-23 supported bursaries at Sidcot and as a School, we provide 10% of our students with means-tested bursarial support annually. Below are a couple of testimonials that illustrate the impact of this support.



Theo Class of 2022

Theo joined Sidcot in Year 7 as a day student from Bournville Primary School in Weston-super-Mare, before becoming a boarder in Year 9. Following his successfully attained International Baccalaureate, Theo progressed to Bath University to study Chemical Engineering. He said:

"Sidcot has helped me to grow so much in self-confidence. Being educated here has allowed me to find myself, to find a second home, to make incredible relationships with people I'd never have met if I'd gone through the mainstream system. Sidcot has absolutely changed my life for the better. I'm just generally so very grateful.

"Sidcot (and particularly, boarding) has broadened my perspectives and allowed me to have more empathy with people. I've also learnt to have faith in my point of view, and to be able to express it. Sidcot has allowed me to feel that I can be myself without judgement. This is in line with the School's Quaker values, to see the good in everyone. It's a principle that is definitely 'lived' here."



Kimu **Current J6**

Kimu joined Sidcot in J6 from Kenya. His Guardian, Dr Christie Peacock, gives this report following his first few terms:

"Kimu's bursary has been life changing. Sidcot has given him the support he needs at a critical time with his dyslexia/learning needs as well as nurturing his natural talent for sport and design. He now loves learning and his reading and writing is improving fast. Kimu says, "the teachers are kind, patient and encouraging and I look forward to going to school every day". He is really flourishing at Sidcot and immensely proud to be part of the School community.

Why I support a Sidcot Quaker Bursary

"When our eldest child was nearing the end of their time at our village primary school we became increasingly desperate in our search for the right secondary provision. None of the local schools provided what we were seeking, and boarding school was beyond our means. Our family has a long Quaker history and a chance conversation with a friend opened our eyes to the potential for bursary support at Quaker schools.

"A visit to Sidcot revealed that the School was exactly what we had been seeking. Financial support we received made it manageable, and our son flourished at the School.


"Now we find ourselves able to contribute to the bursary fund ourselves, so that a Sidcot education can be brought within the reach of other families like us."

The educational impact of a bursary

As a School, we monitor the academic progress of our students. The average value-added (V/A) progress scores of our bursary students in Key Stages 4 and 5 meet our Whole School targets and even slightly exceed the average of those of their peers. This means that as a result of their Sidcot education, they are on average achieving over half a grade higher than they might otherwise have been predicted to do.

- The V/A score for current bursary students Y10-13 is an average of 0.59
- The V/A score for the combined total students in those year groups is an average of 0.49
- The national average V/A score







A Spotlight on the Sidcot Bursary Trust (SBT):

The SBT was set up in September 1983 to provide means-tested bursary support to Sidcot School students - from either Quaker or non-Quaker families - who are in need of financial assistance

Typically, the SBT supports eight pupils annually who would not otherwise have been able to continue their education in the Sidcot tradition. It has a General fund and a Watkins fund, which was bequeathed for use in cases of sudden family emergencies. Grants from the General fund are normally no more than 20% of the standard fees, whilst those from the Watkins fund are as necessary and as available.

Impact:

Over the last 10 years, the Sidcot Bursary Trust has supported 63 students, who went on to work in a range of industries, including the Third Sector, the arts and film creative industries, engineering, and more.

Building ceramic pots in Art

Throughout the Autumn term 2022, we were delighted to work with ELAN students to create some beautiful neolithic ceramic pot artwork.

Our Head of Art, Johannah Egan, gave a masterclass to representatives from each of the schools and provided the materials for creating some beautiful pots in their lessons in school. Their creations were fired in our kiln and the participating students then came together for the grand unveiling of an exhibition showcasing their work, complete with photos of the art-making process.

The students said how proud they were to see their work showcased - and rightly so! Pictured is a photo of the resulting exhibition.

Community Sports

At regular intervals throughout the year, we host and provide transport for the ELAN schools for a range of sporting activities, including gymnastics, cricket, tennis, swimming and athletics. There are always some closelycontested races and games (a favourite will always be the much-loved swimming 'noodle relay'!), but the students always make their schools very proud of their tireless hard work.

Our thanks to all of the participating schools at all of these events, including: Banwell Primary, Bournville Primary, Locking Primary, Oldmixon Primary, Mead Vale Primary, Mendip Green Primary, Milton Park, Walliscote Primary and Windwhistle Primary Schools.

Beyond our Borders

In May 2023, a delegation of 15 of our students visited Brummana High School, our fellow Quaker school in Lebanon to celebrate our shared Quaker heritage. As a particular highlight of our trip, our students took part in a Model United Nations Conference which Brummana High School hosted this year as part of their 150th anniversary celebrations. For this event, our students joined in with Lebanese schools and other international schools from as far as Oman and Luxembourg.

The trip ran as a cooperation of our International Baccalaureate programme and our Centre for Quaker Peace and Global Studies, to consolidate the relationship and intercultural learning between our two schools that has been growing over the past few years.

Travel Awards and Scholarships

Travel Awards

Each year, the Sidcot Education Trust (SET) funds a number of Travel Scholarships to help our students with the costs of travel after leaving School. Projects supported include charitable, conservation or career-enhancing work to make a positive change.

In 2022, three travel awards were allocated: one to Ruby Owen (Class of 2022) for her trip to Kenya to work as an English and Music teacher in a Kenyan Orphanage, one to Molly Whitcombe (Class of 2022) to do environmental work in Spain with the charity LetzLive, and one to Olha Khomiak (Class of 2023) to work with turtles and sloths in Costa Rica. Scholarships

We are proud to support outstanding students in a range of disciplines including Academic, All-Rounder, Equestrian, Art, Design Technology, Performing Arts, Music, Peace & Global Studies, and Sport. In 2022, thanks to a significant generous gift from Canada-based Roger Croker (S: 1948-54), we have been able to introduce three 'Living Adventurously' Sixth Form Scholarships. These are to support those students who show particular aptitude for adventure in their learning. This enthusiasm for adventure can be evidenced by selfdirected exploration in their studies, being courageous, or demonstrating an international mindfulness within the scope of their work. Applications can be made by existing Sidcot students in Year 11, or external students, as part of the usual Scholarship schedule.



'Be in your Flement' at Sidcot!



Ahead of renovation work across five of our Science labs over seven weeks in the Summer holidays 2023, we have an exciting opportunity to commemorate members of our School community within the Bevan Lean Science Building foyer, in the shape of a permanently-fixed Periodic Table.




Old Scholars, Sidcotians, parents, staff and friends of the School can purchase an element for £500 and their name will be engraved under the element, with Sidcot dates

as appropriate. We are hoping to secure a minimum of 88 elements by September so that the periodic table will be complete in time for students' return to School for the autumn term.

All funds raised will support the building work, enabling the purchase of new furniture and pod work stations with Belstone worktops, new suspended ceilings with LED lighting, improved gas and water access for experiments, and the installation of new non-slip latex floors, smartboards, and three fume cupboards.

Elements are going fast so please contact the Development team if you would like to secure yours. And if we can't convince you, perhaps here's someone who can (and who has already claimed his!): "Even great teachers need good facilities to help fire the imagination and curiosity of our young people. Many generations of students have been inspired by stories about science, by class demonstrations and by doing their own experiments at Sidcot. Indeed, my own curiosity was fed by memorable lessons in these very laboratories, but they need updating. A well-designed environment has a significant impact on the way we learn and interact, and I am delighted to endorse this project to revitalise the Sidcot Science Laboratories.
